ORDINANCE NO. 442
AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 15 OF ORDINANCE NO. 229, ADOPTED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM ON DECEMBER 29, 1954, AS AMENDED BY ORDINANCE NO. 407 ADOPTED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM ON JANUARY 24, 1955, ENTITLED:

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF AN AUTOMOBILE PARKING SPACE IN THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, ALABAMA, AND AUTHORIZING THE ACQUISITION OF CERTAIN REAL PROPERTY IN THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM FOR SAID PURPOSES AND FOR THE COST THEREOF.

Section 15 of Ordinance No. 442, as amended by Ordinance No. 407, is hereby amended to read as follows:

The right to reserve to issue additional bonds having priority over the property of the bonds of the bonded indebtedness, but only for the following purposes and on the following conditions:

(A) To complete the acquisition and improvement of Municipal Parking Lot No. 11, to acquire and construct additional street parking facilities in the area generally described as follows:

Municipal Parking Lot No. 11, to be located in the area bounded by Woodland Avenue and Hunter Street and held City of Birmingham, either north or south of Hamilton Avenue.

Provided, however, that the total amount of bonds issued outside of the regular bond issue for the purpose of acquiring or constructing Municipal Parking Lot No. 11, or Municipal Parking Lot No. 11, shall not exceed the amount of \$100,000.00 Dollars, with aggregate principal and interest not exceeding the following:
