

Churches Pause To Honor Work Of YMCA Program

Tribute to workers in the Birmingham YMCA will be paid in the various churches this coming Sunday, Jan. 20 when national radio and TV programs will laud the work of the Young Men's Christian Association.

In making a local release, Edwin F. Kirbert, Executive Secretary, had this to say: "In America as in no other country we truly 'go to different churches together.' We worship as we please . . . in many ways . . . sometimes even argue about which is best. Yet the fact is, our American spirit of service to others, our respect for fair play and, indeed, our great strength as a nation have come about largely because as Christians we have di-

ways worked together for things that are good, no matter what our creed.

"THIS COMING Sunday is Y-M-C-A Sunday, a day on which we recognize the close partnership which exists between the YMCA and the Church. For more than a century the YMCA has been aiding the church through its Christian emphasis program in leading young people to Christ—helping to make sure that future generations continue to go to different churches together," Kirbert continued.

"Youngsters in YMCA groups represent all religions, all denominations. But with the patient hand of the 'Y' on their shoulders they learn to live as Christians in the most practical way . . . by doing."

"Whether sponsoring a paper drive to help boys and girls in a war-torn Europe or contributing hard-earned money to give some needy family a better Christmas, they're doing something for somebody else," he concluded.
