Levin Collection On Display Jan. 12

CRANBROOK — Paintings, sculpture and drawings by famed 20th century artists form the nucleus of the Levin Collection, to be displayed from Wednesday, Jan. 12, through March 6, at the Cranbrook Academy of Art Galleries, according to Wallace Mitchell, new head of the Galleries.

Selected mostly since the war by Mr. and Mrs. Isadore Levin of Detroit during their travels in Europe, the group includes works by sculptors Brauer and Lipchitz, and major paintings by Braque, Chagall and Lefer.

Other modern masters represented in the collection are Picasso, Rodon, Soutine, Klee, Dufy, Matisse, Modigliani and Kuniyoshi. The Galleries are open free to the public daily except Mondays, from 2 to 5.



WALLACE MITCHELL, registrar of Cranbrook Academy of Art and a member of its faculty for 17 years, has been named head of the museum's newly-named Art Galleries under a revised policy of the institution. Mitchell will continue as Academy registrar but will no longer be an instructor.

Order Preliminary Interceptor Plans

The go-ahead sign on preliminary engineering studies for the Five-green interceptor sewer was given by Oakland County Drain Commissioner Ralph A. Main this week.

Both of the consulting firm of Huhnel, Roth and Clark, will start plans for the grant project at once. Initial work on the engineering was made possible when the City of Birmingham and townships of Southfield, Bloomfield and Troy advanced money to the City of Birmingham to act on the loan.
