Eversons Are Guests Of Danish King

Experiences to be treasured for a lifetime are rare for most of us, but one such fell to the lot of Mr. and Mrs. George P. Everson of 4621 Charming Cross when they spent four days as guests of the King and Queen of Denmark.

The Eversons were among the 250 honorary Danish consuls from all over the world who, with their wives, attended a conference sponsored by the Danish government in Copenhagen.

The conference was in the nature of a thank you gesture from the Danes to all the honorary consuls who have given freely and voluntarily without compensation, of their time and effort to promote good will and understanding between Denmark and their various countries.

While the Eversons both have a Danish background, a deep interest in things Danish, and have founded the country before, this was their first trip in an official capacity. The conference drew the attention of the entire world, Mrs. Everson said, for this was the first time such a gathering had ever been held anywhere on the globe of the 500 honorary consuls (total of 250) were able to attend, with 16 of these from the United States.

THE SUCCESS of the gathering may be instrumental in persuading other countries to hold similar meetings for the purpose of furthering international good will.

"One of the things that impressed us most," Mrs. Everson said, "was the fact that the ceremonies were conducted entirely in English, with translations into other languages provided. Even the printed programs were done in English and done as beautifully as if they had originated in our own land."

Features of the entertainment provided for the guests, included formal lunquets, each evening in Christian Borg Castle, the home of King Frederick IX and Queen Ingrid, a command performance of a ballet group and formal presentation of the guests by the King and Queen.

THE CASTLE, itself, Mrs. Everson said, was like a storybook version, with the King's colorful guards in white and the footmen in their red coats.

In addition to their formal bow, Mr. and Mrs. Everson were also granted a private audience with the King and Queen, a privilege that highlighted their unforgettable experience.

Local Cadet, 18, To Train on Jets

Chosen with 16 others in the United States, William M. Heyniger, 5610 Brookdale, will be training to fly jet planes in Tyndall Air Force base, Fla., beginning Saturday.

The 18-year-old youth is one of Civil Air Patrol cadets chosen by the air force for jet training along with regular AF pilots.

The intensive course, for the 18 CAP flight cadets, will be Saturday through August 5, and will include 10 hours of jet orientation, a visit to interception schools for familiarity with the type of flying and bombing groups engaged in tactical air training.

A CAPDET lieutenant in the Birmingham CAP squadron, he has been active in the patrol for two and a half years, winning one of the first CAP flight scholarships offered, which he carried through to his pilot's license.

He has attended the CAP summer encampment, and has earned the patrol's certificate of proficiency. His engineering efforts, the Hans J. Hess, cites him as an outstanding participant in the CAP program.

He and another Michigan youth were chosen by the Michigan wing to compete against two from each of seven states for the two training assignments to the Great Lakes regional board.
