

Beverly, Pembroke School Additions Get First Call

Three forthcoming building projects, part of the \$2,500,000 bond issue passed recently, were termed as most "urgent" for the Birmingham school district's expansion program by the board of education Tuesday.

Due to the over-crowding of students and a present large-scale housing project along the south section of the district on Thirteenth mile road, the board decided this was the "imperative" area to be considered.

ADDITIONS to Pembroke and Beverly schools and the erection of the new elementary school on the Greenfield and 13 Mile road sites are the first three objectives of the board.

Lynn Smith to draw plans for addition of six rooms to Pembroke school, and condemnation proceedings have been started against five of 10 lots at the Greenfield and Thirteenth Mile road sites.

THE BOARD has acquired five of the lots, and the condemnation suit on the remaining five is expected to get a September court date.

No action was taken for addition to Beverly school but according to Dwight D. Ireland, superintendent of schools, "more space would be needed at Beverly by September, 1955."

The board has requested its attorney to arrange for the sale of bonds earlier than November 1, which was the recommended date.

Also discussed for the earliest possible attention after these buildings projects was the Harlan elementary school site on 10 acres, a half-mile south of Watties on Adams, and the lower grade elementary site on the property on Cranbrook northeast of the high school.

IRELAND said a study of the potential growth would be made on these two sites in order to determine how many grades should be included at each school.

The Greenfield-13 Mile school will include 12 classrooms, with two kindergartens.

Ireland pointed out that over 100 homes have already been built in the Lockwood subdivision which will cause space problems at all three schools discussed.

Hire 11 Teachers

Eleven new teachers for the Birmingham public schools were appointed by the Board of Education Tuesday night.

Two high school and three junior high teachers were among those appointed for the school year beginning September 1.

B'ham Considers Salary Increases; Municipal Court

City Attorney Forbes Hascall has been asked to prepare an ordinance amendment to permit a 50 per cent salary increase for Birmingham's two justices.

City Manager Donald C. Egbert has recommended that the justice salary be increased to \$1,875 per year and the associate to \$450 in view of the additional work now handled by them.

Commissioners are not quite convinced they should approve the plan, so will review it again in two weeks.

He said he and Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley have given it much thought and feel such a step is advisable.
