Approve Two Zone Changes, One Rejected

TROY Three zone changes recommended by the township zoning board after a public hearing held July 12, were voted on by the township board at their Monday night meeting.

Zoning board recommendations that a switch of 20 acres from residential to industrial use at Kelly Brook entry road be denied. The request, made by James Submitter, was turned down by the township board.

APPROVED were two other changes. From residential to commercial.

The other change involved four lots on the west side of Wheeler at Harris road. The owners, Max Farley and Herman Hoop, who live nearby, plan to use the lots for retail car lots, according to Norman Barnhart, township zoning vice.

The Man in the Grey Flannel Suit—by Sloan Wilson \$3.50
This can be read in one sitting. It is a story, one that is fast, timely and true. Read it and you will know what friends fit into the characters in this novel.

The Dinner Party—by Gretchen Finletter \$3.00
Somewhere life must be more than in "The Dinner Party" but nowhere else can it be so much fun. Here, for example, you will meet a lady with a lot on her mind—mostly the terrific discovery that the woman she thinks she ought to be and the woman she thinks she is. Humorous, delightful and written with great sensitivity.

The Flower Girls—by Clemencia Diaz \$4.95
This is easily her finest novel. Crowded with dramatic and romantic men and women. It's setting ranges from Covent Garden to Hollywood, its rhythm from the legends of ancient England to tales of Broadway. Don't miss it.

The Healer—by Frank G. Slaughter \$3.95
A tale of legend in the slum, in the rarified atmosphere of Park Avenue and its select professional clientele. This is an intense fast paced novel of professional competition in New York and of a love that knows divided loyalties. Interesting, absorbing, and thoughtful.

Gift from the Sea—Anne Linbergh \$2.75
The setting of this book is the seashore, the time a brief vacation which lifts one from the distractions of everyday existence into the sphere of meditation. As the sea tosses up its gifts, shells, rare and perfect, so the mind, deep and the shells become symbols here for the various aspects of life one contemplates.

Captain Cook and the South Pacific—John Gwyther \$3.50
An enthralling tale of this remarkable man and his voyages in the seventeen hundreds; his explorations of Hawaii, Tahiti, Australia, and all of the South Pacific by this intrepid commander. It is an unknown world and ahead of them lay four years of excitement, hardships, and a thousand wonders for the astonished eyes of these bold and inquisitive eighteenth century Englishmen. Don't miss it.

The Good Shepherd—by C. S. Forester \$3.95
This thrilling account of Captain Krause, commander of the destroyer Keving and his adventure on the broad Atlantic during World War II is equally as thrilling as the Captain Hornblower story.
