Oakland Hills itself has allowed shorts this season for the first time, but a few members still are not giving the cooler park a whole-hearted approval.

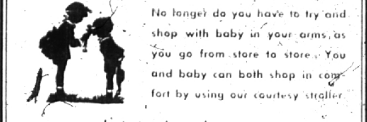
Mrs. Joseph E. Staphinik, secretary of the association, helped to organize the match, but left for Biloxi, Miss., before the tournament.
