Nan Adams 'Guest-Eds' For Fall Mademoiselle

Ellen (Nan) Adams, of Bloomfield Hills, insists she "isn't a journalist," but for the August "College" issue of Mademoiselle magazine she turned reporter long enough to interview playwright Arthur Miller and her co-winners of the magazine's 1955 College Board Contest.

A '55 graduate of Northwestern University who aspires to writing short stories and "maybe something longer," Nan spent the month of June in New York as a guest editor of the magazine's annual "College" issue.

She was one of the twenty winners among the 4,000 undergraduates who competed for this year's guest editorships.

AUGUST MADEMOISELLE features Nan's by-lined thumbnail sketches of her fellow guest editors and an account of her interview with the author of "Death of a Salesman."

Nan's author must tell not only why a character does something—but also why he almost doesn't do it," Miller told the Mademoiselle girl in an interview for the college issue's traditional "We Hit Our Waynes" feature which gives each guest editor a chance to talk with a celebrity in her chosen field.

Nan's first attempt at interviewing—a feature story on Yul Brynner, star of "The King and I" who was studying at Northwestern during the Chicago run of the hit musical—won for her a \$50 first prize in Mademoiselle's College Board contest this spring and helped set her on the road to a guest editorship.

UNLIKE MANY of her fellow guest editors who were seeing New York for the first time in June, Nan found the usual "sights" no novelty after frequent business trips to the city with her father, J. R. Adams, of MacManus, John and Adams Advertising Agency in Bloomfield Hills.

But work on the magazine and the round of Mademoiselle-sponsored events—tours of fashion, merchandising and advertising companies, the screen preview of "My Sister Eileen," the stage performance of "Anastasia," the Mademoiselle college fashion clinic, the Eastern Airlines night flight over the city, the formal dance on the St. Regis Roof, and other parties, sang "The Lord's Prayer" and "O, Perfect Love."

A church reception followed the ceremony.

WHEN THE COUPLE left for their wedding trip to the Thomas ranch in Colorado, the new Mrs. Thomas was wearing a blue suit and white coat.

The groom will enter the U.S. Air Force as a commissioned officer in December.

Gail attended Denison University in Ohio where she was affiliated with Phi Omega social sorority. Her husband graduated from Denison University in June. He was affiliated with Sigma Alpha Epsilon social fraternity.

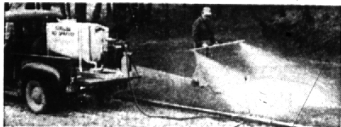

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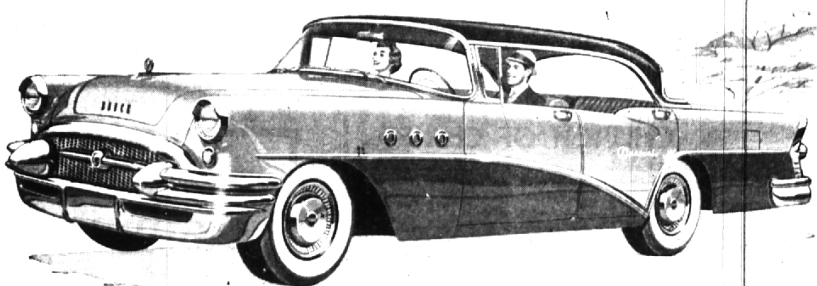
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
