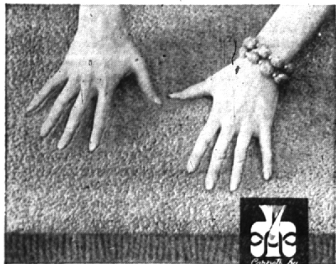

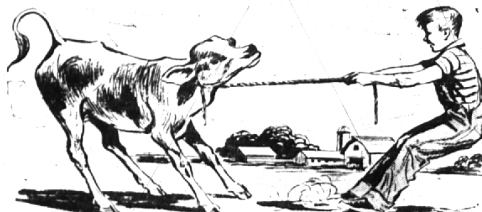
Valeska Graduate Of Advance Course

When you meet this farmer, he'll tell you truthfully that he earns less than factory wages for the time and money spent, but he'll say you'll get your milk, fresh from the farm, tomorrow morning.

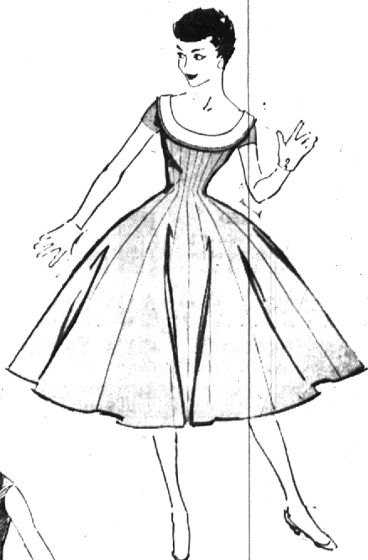
