Seek Control for Dutch Elm Disease

GILBERT LAKE—"Twelve to 15 trees in Lone Pine Village have been infected with Dutch elm disease," Angus Campbell, president of the village association revealed.

Control of the disease was one of the topics discussed at the Lone Pine Village association meeting, held June 28 at Bloomfield Township hall. Discussion of the control centered around the advisability of either individual property owner or association combating the elm disease.

Since the decision of the group favored association control, Campbell appointed a committee to investigate spraying all the elms in the entire subdivision immediately.

Those appointed were Clyde H. McDougall, 4857 Kiethdale, Berkeley Voss, 4805 Kiethdale, James J. Griffin, 4744 Kiethdale and Melvin F. Sterner, 3873 Kiethdale.

It is best if we approach the problem from an association standpoint," Campbell said. "If all but one property owner were to spray his elms, that one tree could infect others. The committee in charge of this project will be accepting bids on spraying the elms in the subdivision."
