Turnpike Law Constitutional, Breakey Rules

A Tuesday ruling of Circuit Judge James K. Breakey, Jr., of Ann Arbor, declared Michigan's turnpike law as constitutional. His decision resulted from a suit by the City of Dearborn, questioning the constitutionality of the law under which the turnpike authority operates.

Judge Breakey said the authority must get the consent of municipal officials to condemn land for the turnpike, but that each case would depend on individual circumstances. An appeal will be made to the state supreme court, according to George Kelly, counsel for the Michigan Highway Protective Association, but he indicated this could not be done in time for a October hearing date.

AMONG Judge Breakey's other rulings on the 12 questions Dearborn presented was that the legislature was specific in determining that state credit would not be used for turnpike construction and debts of the authority would not become debts of the state.

He also ruled out objections against broad powers granted the authority as contradicting the constitutional guarantee that each community would have reasonable control of its streets.

On exempting the authority from constitutional civil service provision, the judge said it has a different status from a normal department of state—its life is limited by the revenue bonds and it was never planned as a general state department.

Troy Township

Only 230 ballots were cast in Troy township with incumbents Arthur Lovejoy and Gerald Baril winning back their seats.

Lovejoy, who was appointed to fill a two-year vacancy two months ago, polled the highest number of votes, 118, among the four candidates.

Lloyd A. Stage was a candidate for the two-year vacancy and he received 80 votes.

Incumbent Gerald Baril, with 10 years on the board, defeated Mrs. Edwin Reed for the three-year term. He polled 128 votes to 97 for Mrs. Reed, who was the first woman candidate since consolidation of the Troy school district.
