Our Shepherd To Dedicate New Addition

Members of Our Shepherd Lutheran Church, E. 14 Mile, will dedicate the new \$50,000 Youth Building at a festival service Sunday morning, June 19, in the 11 a.m. service.

A special 4 p.m. service will present the new facilities to the congregation with a social hour and refreshments to follow.

Guest speaker at the 11 a.m. service will be the Rev. Alvin Heuman. Guest speaker for the afternoon service will be the Rev. T. H. Voss, Pastor of Guardian Lutheran Church, Dearborn.

Although the church is only six years old, dedication will mark its third building venture.

The first wood chapel, built in 1949, was replaced by the present church building in 1951. Constant membership growth has necessitated the construction of the youth building which includes an overflow room for the present 400 members, also Sunday school facilities for the school's attendance that now tops 450.

THE 140 BY 56 foot building addition is modern in architecture. Interiors are finished in light pastel shades and birch wood working. The building includes, besides the church overflow room, a larger meeting hall, Sunday school office, pastor's study, utility rooms, lobby and an addition to the church kitchen.

While primarily constructed to serve youth work, the building also will be used for meetings of the church council, Walter League, Men's club, Women's club, Couples club and the Boy Scout troop.
