License Required For All Motor Boats

Strict enforcement of Michigan's
new boat licensing law started this
week by agents of the Department
of State and other law enforcement
officers.

Under the new law signed by the
Governor May 24, all outboards,
16 feet and over must purchase a
license. In past years only inboards
and sailboats had to be licensed,
and now only boats which are at
least 16 feet in length or those which at all
times are propelled solely by
muscular power.

THE LAW applies to all resi-
dents of Michigan and to all boats
which are moored in Michigan
during a substantial period of the
summer, on the Great Lakes and
on all inland waters.

Operating a boat without a
license is a misdemeanor carrying a
fine of \$100.

IN OAKLAND county a license
can be obtained at the Secretary
of State office 63 N. Perry Street
in Pontiac, or by mail from the
Michigan Dept. of State, Special
license section, Lansing.

Supervisor Cut Expected Soon

Because of a recent legislative
amendment, one of Birmingham's
representatives on the county
board of supervisors shortly will
have to give up his—or her—job,
according to an interpretation this
week from county corporation
counsel Harry J. Merritt.

He said he was expecting at any
time word that Gov. Williams had
signed a bill reappointing super-
visor representation for cities in
Oakland county. The bill has
immediate effect.

The new regulations would give
Birmingham four supervisors, com-
pared to the present five. They are
Mrs. C. B. Lewis, City Assessor
Elmer W. Haack, David Levinson,
Clarence Blemman and Luther Hea-
cock.

IF AND WHEN their charters
are adopted, Southfield and Troy
probably will be entitled to five
and four supervisors, respectively,
Merritt said. They now have only
one.

Lathrup Village also would have
to drop one representative. It now
has two.

Royal Oak would be reduced to 6
from its present 7, and Pontiac
from 10 to 7.

Small Fry Summer Reading Programs

Summer reading programs are
opening at Baldwin public library
this week under the direction of
Kathleen Picket, children's librari-
an.

She said the individual reading
for third through sixth graders
would start June 17, when the
Spaceman's Reading club launches
its program of "New Worlds
through Books."

Each Spaceman will receive a
"blue sky," on which will be pasted
the planets for each type of book
read, and stars for each additional
book in any one field.

At the close of the program,
Aug. 19, the "skies" will be dis-
played in the auditorium to illus-
trate reading taste and habits of
Birmingham youngsters.

The story hour, scheduled as a
weekly event, opens June 21 at
10:30. During the first half-hour
season Miss Picket will read "Rum-
pelstilzkin" and "Fiddieaw."

Bids Due Monday On Ice Rink Bonds

Bids for the sale of \$125,000 in
general obligation bonds will be
opened at 7:30 p.m. June 20 in the
Birmingham city commission room.
City commissioners are expected
to award the sale shortly after
their regular meeting begins at 8
p.m. that same evening.

The money will finance an out-
door skating rink and some park-
ing facilities at Blount park in the
extreme southeast section of the
city.

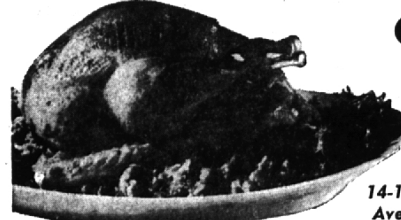

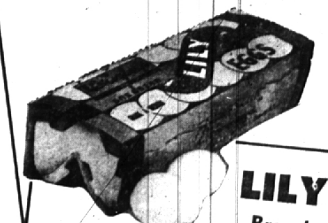
