

First Baptist Pastor Honored at Hillsdale

The Rev. Emil Kontz, pastor of the First Baptist church, will be honored June 5 when he receives a Doctor of Divinity degree from Hillsdale college.

The degree was awarded by Hillsdale faculty and trustees in recognition of the outstanding activities of Mr. Kontz in religious activities in the Detroit area and throughout the Baptist denomination in state and national affairs.

Mr. Kontz has been serving at the local church for seven years. Among his many activities in the field of religion has been his presidency of the Birmingham Council of Churches, Detroit Pastors Conference and two terms for the Detroit Baptist Missionary society.

A native of Carteret, N. J., he spent three years at Bucknell university and one at Franklin-Marshall college, from which he received his A.B. degree.

In addition, his church is making it possible for him and Mrs. Kontz to attend the Baptist World Alliance meetings scheduled for London next July.

The trip will include visits to other European countries, taking about six weeks in all.

POSTGRADUATE work consisted of a year at the University of Budapest, Hungary, and two years at the University of Pennsylvania. Crozer seminary and the University of Chicago divinity school provided his theological training.

Prior to his Birmingham pastorate, Mr. Kontz had been with the Lincoln Baptist church in Cincinnati for seven years and the West Pullman Baptist church, Chicago, six years.

Under his guidance, the local Baptist church has enjoyed a steady growth, maintaining an active part in church, civic and educational affairs.
