## Cranbrook Honors Swedish Sculptor On 80th Birthday

CRANBROOK — The 80th birthday of Carl Milles, famed Swedish-American sculptor, will be marked today at Cranbrook by the opening of a two-week exhibition of his sculpture in the Cranbrook Academy of Art galleries.

Notification of the award of the Founders Medal will also reach him at his summer home in Lidjingo, Sweden, accompanied by a resolution of the Cranbrook Foundation trustees which stipulates, in part, that "he be honored for his long and helpful participation in the development of the Cranbrook Academy of Art and his many creative contributions to art throughout the Western World."

MILLES, still an active artist with studios in Rome, was for 21 years resident sculptor and head of the sculpture department of Cranbrook Academy of Art, where he created many of the large fountain groups now standing in major cities of Europe and the United States.  
Cranbrook has more than 70 Milles works on its grounds or in buildings of the six institutions, the largest such collection except that at his home, now a national park in Sweden.
