

Appoint Watchowski To SEOCW Board

LATHRUP—City Administrator Leonard Watchowski was appointed as the city's representative to the SEOCW County Water Authority board for one year, beginning July 1.

His alternate, Charles D. Kelley, who has served on the board since the authority was initiated, declined the reappointment because all members of the authority were representatives of a city government. Kelley has no city office.

Approve Paving At Public Hearing

LATHRUP—Council members Monday night resolved to pave 16 street areas in the city and ordered the assessor to prepare special assessment rolls for the districts after a public hearing attended by about 70 persons.

The council also ordered the city administrator, Leonard Watchowski, to advertise for bids which must be in the hands of the council by July 18.

Arthur W. Gillespie, civil engineer, who did preliminary surveying of the projects, estimated that cost of paving a 20-foot wide street would be about \$189 per front foot, and that 18-foot-wide streets would cost approximately \$169 per front foot.

Grading and ditching would be included in the cost of the project, said Gillespie. We can get the water down to the catch basins, but what happens after that we won't know," he said.

Fred Johnson of 27333 Goldengate, speaking for himself and neighbors, asked the council for a street paving 20 feet wide, and that excess gravel be removed to cut the slope of the pavement, and that the competitive bids include a square yard price to include work on side drives, to be paid for by the individual owner as the work is completed.

The council accepted Johnson's recommendations and also approved the paving of Sunset to a width of 28 feet.

"We want a 28-foot street to eliminate the dust condition," said Johnson. "We also want a competitive bidding on a square foot or yard basis established. We know how these contractors work, and we think we can save some paving expense by this method."

"That's smart business," said Councilwoman Kathryn Feyereisen. "It would only be a little more work for our administrator to get competitive bids—that's a good idea."

Everett Nelson of 17265 Wiltshire, who also desired side drive paving, said, "If a bid on street paving is low and the same bidder is high on side drive paving costs I would rather pay a local dollar on the street and pay the higher rate on my side drive."

Councilwoman Feyereisen emphasized that the two bids, however would be combined in one. Gillespie said that paving from the street to the edge of the residential walk would be included in the cost of the overall paving project.

Only other serious debate was over the depth of gravel on Goldengate. Johnson contended that 10 to 15 inches could be removed without destroying the base, while Gillespie maintained that lowering the street level by a foot might mean a cost of as high as \$10 to \$12 a front foot.

"We don't want a street that is 10 inches high at the crown so that we slip off into the ditch whenever there is a glaze on the road," said Johnson.

Engineers, the council and Goldengate representatives decided to conduct an investigation of the road before paving was begun to determine how much gravel may be removed, and still keep the cost per front foot under \$2.

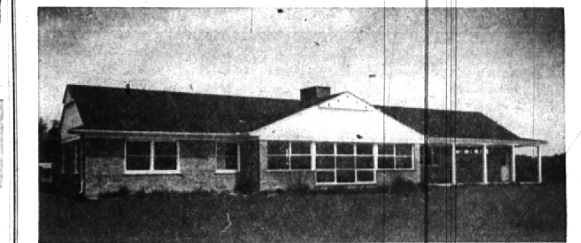

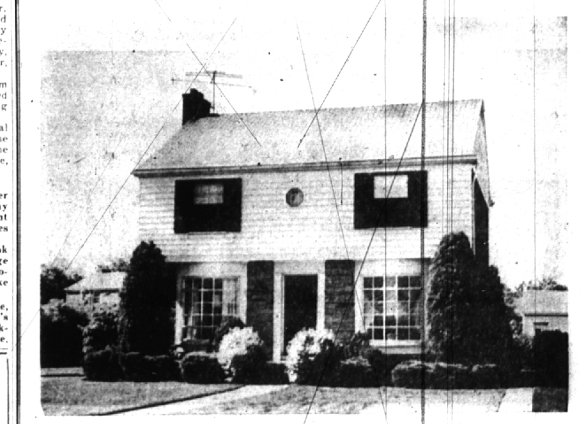
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
