Darling, Sunningdale, entertained 34 members of the Roseale Neighborhood Garden club at a box social dinner last Saturday.

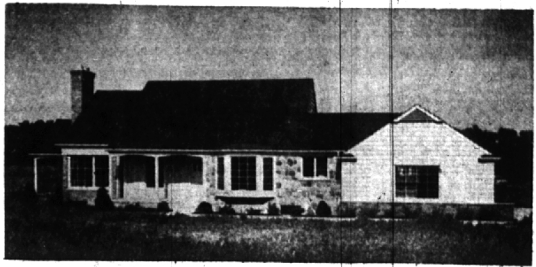
