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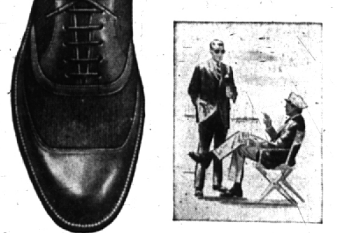
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Obituary Notices

"I WISH to congratulate the League of Women Voters for maintaining their integrity and not bowing to the will of persons who, in their quest for power, will resort to anything to attain it.

"I would like to see the members of the board and citizens' committee at any time and at any place convenient to them.

"Naturally, I feel that any evasion on their part of this challenge would signify that the persons who claim my statements were 'false and misleading' are guilty of besmirching the character of a person without the privilege of an answer, which is un-American, dictatorial and totalitarian and has no place in the educational area in America.

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
