

Elect at Picnic

Monday night, commissioners accepted City Manager D. C. Egbert's recommendation that the city proceed on its own solve its Rouge River pollution problems, and authorized construction drawings and engineering reports to be finalized. According to Egbert, this will take about 90 days.

If Birmingham is to be kept in the Evergreen drain, the other communities will have to take gigantic steps within that 12-week period, Egbert warned.

THE CITY manager criticized the delays in getting this giant interceptor under way, and laid the blame primarily at Southfield township's doorstep.

He said Southfield was moving much too slowly on this project. "We can't sit here for another six to twelve months as we have been for the past four years—we've got to get our own problems solved," Egbert emphasized.

THE FIVE communities, which also include Bloomfield Hills, Lathrup Village, and Bloomfield township, already are in default of a state order to clean up their pollution of the Rouge river.

In all these Evergreen drain negotiations, Birmingham never abandoned the possibility it might have to go its own way and make several hundred thousand dollars worth of improvements to its Cranbrook road disposal plant.
