But as Weddige and three students from University of Michigan, where he is a professor, placed and wired paintings on diagonal ten-

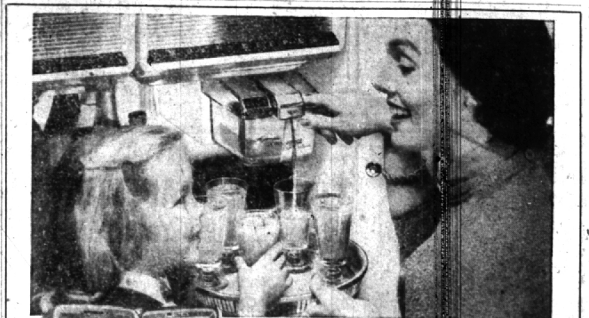
two weeks by Mrs. Hoppin who returned them from Haiti with preliminary sketches of the native girl.
