Ornithologist Is Speaker For Guest Night Program

The Birmingham Branch of the Woman's National Farm and Garden Association has arranged a special program for its March meeting. The husband-guest night program is scheduled for 8 p.m., Monday, March 14, in the social hall of the First Presbyterian church.

Alfred E. Runk of Ramsey, N. J., the guest speaker, is to present "Planting to Attract Birds." He will also show a film which is one of a series of technical motion pictures produced, filmed and edited from the viewpoint of the biologist, landscape architect and horticulturist, as well as that of the ornithologist.

In his bird sanctuary in the foothills of the Ramapo Mountains in New Jersey, Mr. Runk has stocked his miniature botanical garden with various plants to determine which trees, shrubs, and vines our feathered friends prefer for food, cover and nesting. More than 170 species have sampled life at this sanctuary the past few years.
