Local Altrusans are giving thought and attention to the Founders' Fund Vocational Aid program, newest of the major projects of Altrusa International, Inc., which has more than 400 clubs and 12,000 members in the United States and elsewhere.

The fund, a memorial to the women who founded Altrus, April 11, 1917, at Nashville, Tenn., has been established to provide financial assistance to other women who wish to make themselves employable or prepare themselves for more lucrative positions.

CHOSEN on the basis of aptitude and need, the women are carefully screened. The names of those approved are then sent to the Altrusa International rotating committee of three, together with recommendations from the club of how much each woman is to receive. Grants range from \$50, minimum, to \$250, maximum.

Approximately \$5,000 has been given out right to more than 25 women since March 1933, in order that they may learn new skills, take brush-up courses, buy pieces of equipment or purchase presentable clothing for interviewing possible employers.
