Ask Public To League's Meet on Park

"Widespread interest and ardent partisanship in the controversy has led the League of Women Voters to open its meeting to the public," says a league representative of its Spain park meeting on March 21. The league's general meeting will feature Mayor Charles Henfrey, telling the commission's reasons for deciding to move the city's park to provide parking area, and Albert Riehling, a citizen with arguments against the move. City manager Donald Egbert

will attend the meeting also, to answer questions of a factual nature pertaining to the proposal. The meeting will be at 1:15 p.m. at the Community House. The proposal, to be voted on in the April 4 election, calls for moving the park one block south. Congestion and parking are reasons expected to be discussed by the mayor, while Riehling will probably be voicing views of the opposition. "He will express the disapproval, on both aesthetic and practical grounds, of a large segment of townspeople to the proposed change," according to Mrs. Harper Sebbidge, league press representative. A 15-minute panel by Board of Recreation members on the bond issue proposal for a municipal skating rink and increased tennis facilities, will precede the major part of the program.
