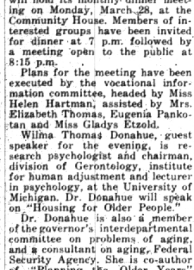
## OES Initiation Set For March 30

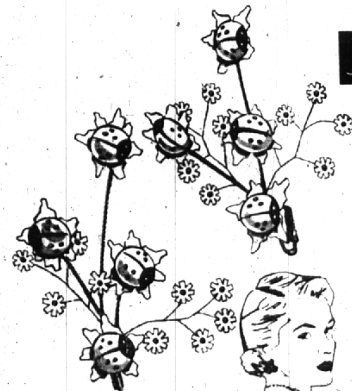

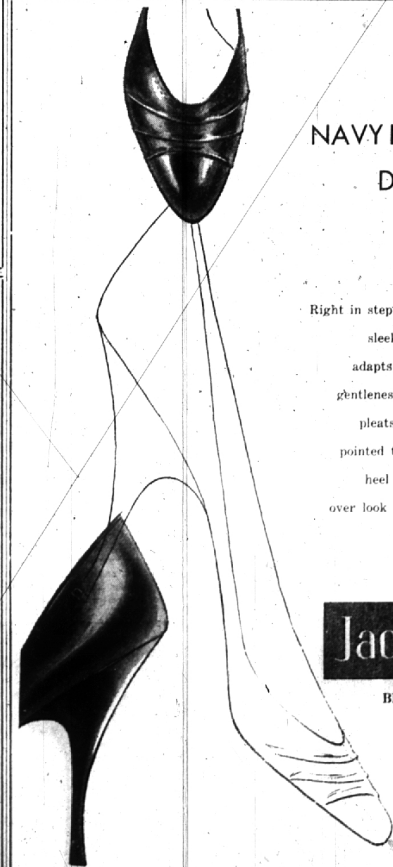

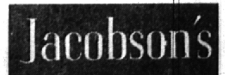
