The foundation stone was laid in 1897 and the Bethlehem chapel was opened in 1912.

Cranbrook Artist Carving Lutheran Church Crucifix

"The chance of the new Ascension Lutheran church will be as devotional and impressive as it will be unique and artistic," the Rev. Paul Shippert said this week.

"The crucifix to the altar is a column of white travertine, 10 feet wide, extending from the floor to the roof," he continued.

"On this, above the altar, a larger-than-life size carved crucifix will be hung. Left in the natural wood coloring, it will be carved from Honduras mahogany.

"It will depict the crucified, risen, ascended and reigning Christ, rather than the more common crucifix which symbolizes only the events of Good Friday."

THE CRUCIFIX will be the work of Glenn Chamberlain, resident sculptor at Cranbrook academy of art.

Mr. Shippert said that far from being an innovation of questionable orthodoxy, the Chamberlain work marks a return to a conception that prevailed in the Christian church for centuries.

"Christ is shown adhering to the Cross, not hanging from it; He is alive and shows no signs of physical suffering; testifying to His words, 'I am the resurrection and the life.'"

"This magnificent work looks be-

yond the sufferings of Good Friday to the glory to which they led and the redemption which they wrought for all mankind," Mr. Shippert concluded.

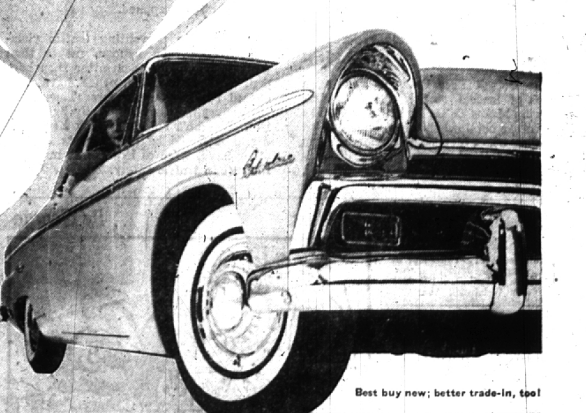
