Two City Commissioners (Full Three year term), One City Commissioner (To fill vacancy, Two year term), Two Members of the Library Board, One Justice of the Peace, One Associate Justice of the Peace, One Constable, and to vote on the following city proposals:

Bonding Proposition

SHALL THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN, BORROW THE SUM OF NOT TO EXCEED ONE HUNDRED TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND (\$125,000.00) DOLLARS, AND ISSUE ITS GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS THEREFOR, FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONSTRUCTING AN ARTIFICIAL ICE SKATING RINK AND OTHER NECESSARY FACILITIES IN CONNECTION THEREWITH, TO BE LOCATED AT ETON PARK IN SAID CITY OF BIRMINGHAM?

Charter Amendment — Sewers and Drains

SHALL SECTION 1 OF CHAPTER XII OF THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, STATE OF MICHIGAN, BE AMENDED TO PROVIDE THAT THE COMMISSION OF THE CITY MAY CONTRACT FOR THE DISPOSAL OF SEWAGE THROUGH A SYSTEM WHICH MAY BE ESTABLISHED BY THE COUNTY OF OAKLAND SUCH AS THE PROPOSED EVERGREEN INTERCEPTOR SYSTEM?

(Section 1 of Chapter XII is printed herewith as proposed, immediately followed by the Section as then reads.)

Chapter XII Sewers and Drains

Section 1. The Commission may establish, construct and maintain a sewerage system, sewage disposal system, sewers and drains whenever and wherever necessary. Such systems, sewers and drains may be constructed either within or without the city or partly within and partly without the city. The commission may contract with any other governmental unit or units for sewerage and drainage facilities, provided that any such contract other than one for the disposal of sewage through the Southeastern Oakland County Sewage Disposal System, or any other system which may be established by the County of Oakland such as the proposed Evergreen Interceptor System, shall be approved by two-thirds of the electors voting thereon at a general or special election.

NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN, that said Section 1 now reads as follows:

Chapter XII Sewers and Drains

Section 1. The commission may establish, construct and maintain a sewerage system, sewage disposal system, sewers and drains whenever and wherever necessary. Such systems, sewers and drains may be constructed either within or without the city or partly within and partly without the city. The commission may contract with any other governmental unit or units for sewerage and drainage facilities, provided that any such contract other than one for the disposal of sewage through the Southeastern Oakland County Sewage Disposal System shall be approved by two-thirds of the electors voting thereon at a general or special election, and to vote on the following question for advisory purposes:

Re-location of Shain Park

SHALL "SHAIN PARK" BE RE-LOCATED IN THE BLOCK IMMEDIATELY TO THE SOUTH THEREOF, AND THE AREA OF SAID EXISTING PARK USED FOR A MUNICIPAL PARKING LOT?

and to vote on the following Constitutional Amendment:

- No. 1 An Amendment to Section 23 of Article VII of the State Constitution providing that the conduct of non-partisan primary elections and elections for judicial offices shall be prescribed by law.
- No. 2 An Amendment to Section 17 of Article VII of the State Constitution relative to the qualifications of supreme court and circuit court judges.
- No. 3 An Amendment to Article X of the State Constitution by adding a new Section 27 authorizing the borrowing of not to exceed \$100,000,000.00 for loans to school districts.
- No. 4 An Amendment to Article III of the State Constitution by adding a Section 9 and an amendment to Section 20 of Article VI of the State Constitution providing that a state board of canvassers shall be established by law.

Wing Lake PTO Hears Plans For Summer Play Program

When Wing Lake school PTO held its regular meeting Wednesday, March 16, Mrs. Max Miller, president, introduced William McGuire, sixth grade teacher at Wing Lake school, who presented his plans for the new summer playground program.

Organized recreation for the children of the Wing Lake and Foxcroft area, under consideration for some time, will actually be realized this season from June 27 to August 5. McGuire will be the playground director, assisted by an arts and crafts teacher and possibly one other staff member.

Children eligible for the first grade next September and those through sixth grade age will be accepted, but must enroll in order to participate. The enrollment fee is \$15 for the six-weeks term. Members of the Wing Lake school PTO board will be at the school Tuesday, March 29 to take enrollment, which will close the end of April.

The playground will operate five days a week from 10:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. On rainy days, activities will be held in the all-purpose room of the school.

McGuire has an excellent program and a wealth of material already in hand, including such things as playground team, softball teams for the older boys, tennis, hand-crafts, nature study, organized group games and stories and little games for the little folk. There will be a picnic one week and other extra activities as the situation demands. Bike, hobo and pet parades will add to the fun.
