# Beverly Wife Visits Her Parents In Spain

Going to Spain to visit her parents, for the first time since she left Persia over seven years ago, Mrs. Otto Turchan of Buckingham street, Beverly Hills, left Friday.

"I've been nervous all week," the dark-haired Armenian wife said as she packed Thursday for the three-month trip to Europe.

She was accompanied to New York, where she sailed on the Queen Mary Saturday, by her husband, a young Czech-born mechanical engineer and physicist who next week will be starting a new job on the West Coast.

AN INTERNATIONAL CLUB dance Tuesday evening at the University of Detroit where Mrs. Turchan was then a student, and University of Detroit where Otto had come in 1946 to study after taking his bachelor's degree in Prague university, was where the Turchans met. They were married two and a half years ago.

Armine, who has been here for five years, will be graduating from Marygrove in June, and the Turchans will both be back for the event. Shortly thereafter, they'll be moving to California.

Turchan will begin his new job there next week, becoming research director for Hughes Aircraft corporation. He has a master's and Ph.D. in physics from U. of D. and has been research director for his uncle's firm, Turchan Followers Machinery, in Detroit.
