Resident sculptors at Cranbrook Academy of Art, Bloomfield Hills, Mich., for twenty years, Milles has designed monuments and fountains for over fifty cities in Europe and the United States, including New York, Chicago and St. Louis. He has received citations from American art societies and universities, and became a United States citizen in 1945.

"Stardust" was title of the couples received as they entered the senior hall at University of Michigan, in which two Birmingham seniors took leading parts, last Friday night.

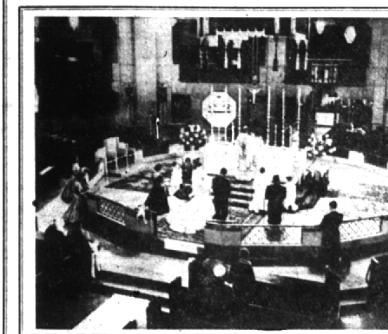
