Foreign Exchange Student Will Be Invited to City

Would your family like to have a "new" teenage son or daughter?

A Birmingham family will have the privilege, next year, of having a foreign exchange student in its home for the school term, under the American field service plan.

Birmingham board of education has waived special tuition charges, and a high school Student Congress has given its unanimous approval to clear the way for an exchange student to come to Birmingham.

The American field service sponsors a program by which foreign boys and girls 16 and 18 may spend a year in the United States living with an American family.

The student must be sponsored in his community by an organization or individual contributing \$500 for passage from his native land. The Student Congress is willing to accept the responsibility of raising this fund and so all that is left is choosing the residence.

THE FAMILY is to accept the student into the household, to share equally in pleasures and duties of the home. Parents will have the same authority over the student as they have over their own, and therefore have the same responsibility of care and affection.

The AFS considers these two questions most important in choosing the home: Is the family truly warm-hearted, affectionate within itself, friendly to others, with a real liking for young people and is it capable of dealing with them cheerfully and sensibly?

BEFORE DECIDING to house a student, a family must take several factors into consideration. Even though students are chosen for personal as well as academic qualities, there are still differences in customs and attitudes with which the family will have to deal sympathetically.

Despite whatever assistance in money or gifts the family may receive during the year, the student is still certain to be a financial burden to some extent.

The visitor will have an allowance of \$12 dollars per month, less deductible from income tax as a dependent, but is insured through AFS for accident and illness.

NO FOREIGN born families are to be considered, for the student may share a room with another.

Young Scientists Busy at C and C

Three subjects, weather, insects and reptiles, are study topics of young scientists at the City and Country school, Bloomfield Hills.

A weather station is under construction by the juniors with Mike Fried and Eric Wimselman rebuilding their wet and dry bulb hygrometer.

A collection will provide material for microscope study.

Young herpetologists among the juniors are spending some time by the lake and pond searching for specimens. They are building a terrarium and are hoping for a small snake to put in it.

Joe Walker has been named the authority on snakes and has supplied the class with a book on the subject.

Second graders have started a "Things We Like" project, taking first "Things We Like to Touch" and planning for the "Hear and Smell" group.
