**Ice Rink Plans
Awarded Architect**

Architectural and engineering services for the \$125,000 artificial ice-skating rink to be constructed at Glen park, are being awarded to the firm of O'Dell, Hewlett and Luchenbach, by 5-1 margin of the city commission.

Of the total amount for construction, five percent goes to architectural and engineering, which will consist of site planning, preliminary sketches, working drawings, specification, assistance in bidding and supervision of construction and contract payments.

The completion of the ice rink is expected for November 1, 1955.
