

### Forecast Large Bloomfield Hills School Enrollment

The school district of Bloomfield Hills has been growing in leaps and bounds, and according to the recent report of the Michigan State College Survey committee the enrollment would double in two years and double again in the two succeeding years.

According to superintendent of schools, Eugene L. Johnson, the enrollment of the Hills district has jumped from 600 to 1,200 in two years.

### Drunk Driver Fined, Jailed After Crash

**SOUTHFIELD**—A 10-day jail term, a \$50 fine and 225 costs was the penalty of Jack A. Paezel, 34, of Detroit who pleaded guilty Monday to driving under the influence of liquor, before Southfield Justice Edward E. Hanley.

Paezel was arrested Saturday night at Northland and Northwestern highway by Township Police Chief Phillip LaVigne and Patrolman Charles Durkin after the driver rammed two cars halted for a traffic light.

No one was injured, said LaVigne, but \$500 damage occurred to cars operated by Ernest Dahmann, 35, and James M. Smith, 27, both of Detroit.

Paezel's driver's license was automatically suspended for 90 days.

**TOWNSHIP OF BLOOMFIELD OAKLAND COUNTY MICHIGAN BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP ZONING CONTROL**  
ORDINANCE NO. 33  
An Ordinance to provide for the regulation and control of motor traffic on certain streets and highways in the Township of Bloomfield, Orleans County, Michigan.

Section 1. Any person driving a vehicle on a street or highway in any plateland within the Township of Bloomfield shall drive the same at a careful and prudent speed not greater than is reasonable and proper, having due regard to the traffic, surface and width of the highway or any other condition then existing and no person shall drive a vehicle upon a highway at a speed greater than would permit him to bring it to a stop within the assured clear distance ahead.

Section 2. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance on conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$100 and costs of prosecution or 10 days in the county jail or both such fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the court.

Section 4. This ordinance will take effect 180 days after its publication, made and passed by the Township Board of Bloomfield Township this 16th day of May, 1955.

### Home Building Locally Hits 5-Year High

Oakland County home builders hit a five-year high in 1954 with construction of 12,700 dwelling units, and a good deal of those units were built in the Birmingham area. Of these, 11,917 were single-family units.

Figures released for January, February and March, 1955, by the Detroit Regional Planning Commission also showed that Southfield and Bloomfield townships were off to a good start again this year.

### BLOOMFIELD had issued 190 permits during the first three months of this year, and Southfield was only one behind with 189.

Others were: Birmingham, 27; Bloomfield Hills, 9; Troy township, 30; and West Bloomfield, 147.

Birmingham was the only one of six communities listed that did not exceed the past four years with its units, while the entire county 1954 building program. In fact, it was the second lowest (265 units).

During this same five-year period the six communities have constructed a total of 11,510 dwelling units, while the entire county was constructing 46,403 similar buildings.

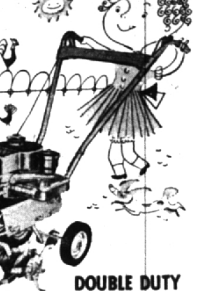

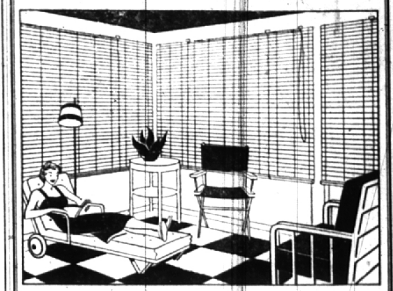
