**Plans for Everett Paving Postponed**

SOUTHFIELD — Plans for paving on Everett from 12 Mile to Wilshire folded Tuesday night at a public hearing when three of the petitioners withdrew their names because of an increase in the estimated cost of the project.

The original estimate was \$7 per foot while the lowest bid called for \$9.99 per foot.

All objectors to the paving in one block but the second block's paving program was stopped because of a possible increase in price.

Petitioners were asked to submit a new petition with enough names to carry the project and the board tabled the hearing until June 14.

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**Board Considers Zoning Changes To Allow Parking**

SOUTHFIELD — A request for use of residential property was given favorable consideration by the township board last night when they referred a request by Nelson Realty company back to the zoning board for further study.

Woodrow Nelson, James Jardeck and other owners of commercial land on the northeast corner of 10 Mile and Southfield, wish to erect a grocery and meat store, a dining room, cleaning pick-up station, and an office for manufacturers' agents, and use lots 274-5 and 18-22 for parking.

The lots are now zoned residential and a previous request was denied because of residents in the area.

John Allen, Royal Oak attorney, pointed out that off-street parking does not come within the safety factor and his plea to the board indicated a need for the residential land to provide adequate and safe parking for customers of the commercial block.

**'Orphan Orchards' Families Petition To Join Bloomfield**

SOUTHFIELD — "Orphan Orchard," a nine-acre strip in the northwest corner of the township, has petitioned the township board for annexation to Bloomfield township.

The owners of the isolated area which was not included in Franklin Village's incorporation and cannot be included in Southfield's incorporation as a city, all signed the petition which now must go to the Bloomfield township board and the Oakland County board of supervisors for approval.

Those in the Sacto tract are the families of Herbert H. Reske of 2722 W. 14 Mile, F. Lyle Goldman of 2760 W. 14 Mile, and Dr. Gordon T. Greig of 27160 W. 14 Mile.

**Southfield Rejects Planners' Sub Okay**

SOUTHFIELD — Plans for Southfield Farms subdivision in the northwest 1/4 of the northeast 1/4 of section 25, which had been approved by the planning commission, were referred back to the commission by the township board Tuesday night.

Board members contend that the proposed lots in the subdivision do not meet minimum requirements and will ask the commission why the plans were approved. The development is owned by Spoon Brothers of Detroit.

**Strengthen Building Code Requirements**

LATHRUP — The city council increased requirements for commercial buildings when they passed ordinance 21, an amendment to ordinance 4, the building code, by a 3 to 1 vote Monday night.

Councilman William H. Harvie voted "no" on the ordinance, contending that councilmen should have time to study the proposal which was prepared by Mayor John C. Campbell.

The tightened restrictions affect exterior wall construction, provide for particular types of brick veneering, and requires metal reinforcement of footings and exterior walls. The ordinance goes into effect June 6.

**Hudson's Ask Zone Change On 8 Mile**

SOUTHFIELD — Township board members Tuesday declared intention of approving the rezoning of 5/8-mile east of Southfield along Eight Mile road.

The land, owned by Hudson's of Detroit, was zoned commercial to a depth of 200 feet, but the company wants a 400-foot deep commercial strip.

A public hearing will be set by the township board before the change in zoning is finally approved.

**City's Protest Goes to County**

Its official and detailed protest against the rezoning of a triangle of property in Troy township has been forwarded by the Birmingham city commission to the Oakland county zoning coordination committee.

It is this committee, city officials contend, which must approve the rezoning of the property east of Adams and north of Derby road.

Controversy centers over the use of this area, which the city desires to see developed as residential. The township only recently rezoned it commercial.

**THE CITY** resolution declared it "is unalterably opposed" to the proposed new use.

It cited as reasons the lack of need for a commercial area at that point, the proposed new junior high school immediately south of Derby, and desires of both township and city residents to keep the area residential in character.

The Birmingham board of education also has made official protest to the county.

**Kay Cooley Begins Store Expansion**

Kay Cooley Inc., of 190 W. Maple, this week began construction of a 40 x 60 addition to their building, which should be completed about Aug. 1.

The new wing will house a suit and coat department, according to Miss Cooley, a Birmingham resident who has owned the store for 16 years. This is the third enlargement of the Cooley store.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Chenault, 391 Tilbury.

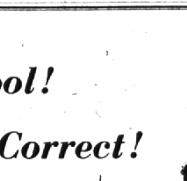
**Art Galleries Will Close Memorial Day**
