

Start Wabeek Bank Addition

Expansion of the Wabeek Bank building was started this week, and when completed the \$35,000, two-story addition will allow for increased office space and a ground-floor vault, according to William R. Yaw, president of the Wabeek Corporation.

The 2500-foot addition to the rear of the building at Maple and Bates may take as long as six or eight months so as to not interrupt daily operations, Yaw said.

The second story portion will be for office space while the lower floor will provide space for a vault. It is expected to give more working room to those on the ground floor, said Yaw.
