Have You Met

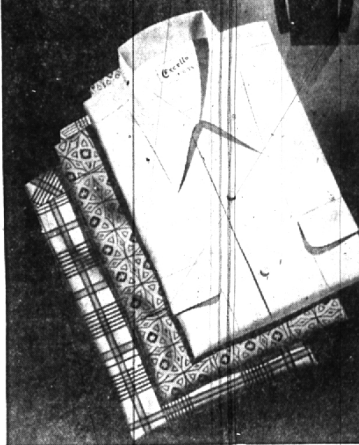
