

Expect 50 Drivers to Compete Saturday in Teenage 'Road-E-O'

A field of 200 entrants in the annual Birmingham teenage "Road-E-O" will be shaved to about 50 drivers when they finally meet in driving competition at the high school at 9:30 a.m. Saturday.

The other 150 will be eliminated through written tests given at the high school during classes this week, according to Claude Kidd, president of the sponsors, the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Competition, already restricted to those teen-agers who have not had a moving traffic violation during the past year, will include parking, backing on white lines, driving between barrels and turning. Chairman of the contest is Frank Mulholland.

PLAQUES will be awarded to the boy winner and the girl winner, and the best driver will compete at Lansing in June during state finals. The winner there goes to Washington, D. C., to compete with youngsters from the other 47 states for national honors and a scholarship.

A sports car show at the high school parking lot at the same time is expected to draw a good deal of attention, said Kidd. Jaycees expect to have a Cadillac Eldorado, a Ford Mustang, and a Buick among the sports models on display.

FOUR auto companies, Harold Turner, North Chevrolet, Schulz Motors and Keller-Koch, Inc., will provide cars for contestants.

Judges, who are local insurance agents, will be headed by William Roberts.

Et. Henry Timm will represent the Birmingham Police department and members of the Michigan State Police and Oakland County sheriff's department will also be on hand.

Refreshments will be handled by the Birmingham Jaycees Auxiliary.

Please Take Notice that the Board of Education of School District No. 2, Fractional, Townships of Bloomfield, Troy and West Bloomfield and City of Bloomfield Hills, County of Oakland, Michigan, has called an annual election to be held in said School District on June 13, 1955.

Section (2) of Act 199, Public Acts of Michigan, 1951, effective September 28, 1951, provides as follows:

"The Inspectors of election at any annual or special election shall not receive the vote of any person residing in a registration school district whose name is not registered as an elector in the city or township in which he resides * * *"

THE LAST DAY on which persons may register with the Clerk of the City or Township in which they reside in order to be eligible to vote at said annual election called to be held June 13, 1955, is Friday, June 3, 1955. Persons registering after 5:00 o'clock p.m., Eastern Standard Time, on said Friday, June 3, 1955, are not eligible to vote at said annual election.

Under the provisions of Act 199, Public Acts of Michigan, 1951, registrations will not be taken by school officials, and only persons who have registered as general electors with the Clerk of the City or Township in which they reside are registered school electors. Persons planning to register with City and Township Clerks must ascertain the days and hours on which the Clerk's office is open for registration.
