Captain Bob Goldsmith was Birmingham's best with 77, followed by Tim Baldwin with 85, Sandy Siegel with 84 and Mike Conroy with 85.

ALL OF the services of the Moms and nearly 150 men to keep the league in operation have been on strict voluntary basis.
