

City to Have 3 Taxi Firms Following Split

Principles of the Birmingham cab company, M. Thompson and M. Janis, have advised the city commission of their desire to dissolve operation as a partnership and to operate his own taxicab company. The result of splitting the assets of the company will give each principle four cabs each and bring about the operation of three taxicab firms in the city. The Veterans cab company operates a fleet of eight cabs in Birmingham.

TENTATIVELY, Thompson and Janis have suggested to continue operation of the Birmingham Cab company under joint agreement until October, after which each would initiate his own operation.

First Local Polio Clinic To Be May 7

Two clinics will operate in Birmingham Saturday, May 7, for the administration of the first 1955 Salk polio vaccine here.

Working together, Mrs. Anice Gillette, city nurse, and Miss Frances Curran, school nurse, have planned the half-day clinics for Birmingham High and Pierce schools.

Children from Quarton and Torry schools will be taken to the high school at 9 a.m.; Bloomfield school at 9:30; Baldwin, Walnut Lake and Franklin at 9:45; and Holy Name at 10:15. The Pierce clinic will receive Adams and Our Lady Queen of Martyrs schools at 9 a.m.; Bloomfield school at 9:30; Baldwin, Walnut Lake and Franklin at 9:45; and Holy Name at 10:15.

MICHIGAN'S health department, according to Mrs. Gillette, is recommending that all children who received the vaccine last year have a booster injection this spring.

Parents will receive a white notice from schools listing full information for these booster shots. They will be administered May 18 at Quarton school. Bus transportation will be supplied through the board of education.

Green slips will notify parents whose children are eligible to participate in the May 7 and June 4 clinics, Miss Curran said. Mrs. Howard Riemann, who has had charge of preparing the clinics and directing volunteers in preparing lists and materials, said the clinics would handle about 2,900 May 7 and June 4, with an additional 800 booster shots.
