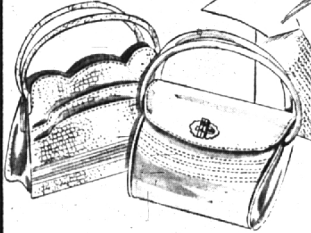

The exquisite **BLENKO GLASS** and **BRASS WATERING POTS** will grace her home for years when she fills them with **LILIES**, **TUBEROSES**, **PEONIES**, **GLADIOLUS** and other blooms deriving from the **BULBS** and **ROOTS** you give her now and which she can plant with a **NO BLISTER TROWEL**, cultivate with a light, beautifully balanced **ALL-PURPOSE HOE**, water with a light, durable **KOROSEAL HOSE** and **THOMAS IRRIGATOR**, and cut with a pair of chrome plated **FLOWER CUTTERS** (after slipping on a pair of plastic **GARDEN BOOTS** over her shoes or tootsies) while keeping her hands "nice" with **SOFT TOUCH GLOVES** even while protecting the plants with insecticides and fungicides which even the youngest **MOTHER** (we don't have these) can apply with a **HAYES SPRAY GUN** (we do have these) after trimming up the surrounding area with a fine, lightweight **CLEMSON LAWN MOWER** and snuffing out the persistent dandelion with a **KILLER KANE** (perish the thought) and if some of the flowers are in dirty, ugly, cracked, nasty-looking little old red clay pots she can cover them with new, gay, handsome **STRAW POT COVERS** and then join in a game of **CROQUET** with those who love her so much they will let her win (special instructions on how to do this) and at the same time her potted plants will be watered by neat little **WEEK-END-WILLIE** and as the game nears the end she can don her **ASBESTOS GLOVES** as she produces a rare to well-done steak on her new **GRILL**, to show her appreciation for your thoughtfulness on this special day (which should be the same as the other 364 days) and then sit down at a new **HANDI-TABLE** or **ALL-LUMINUM TABLE** and contemplates the fantastic sweep of sentiment and emotion that has just about overcome her on this day.

From the sublime to the ridiculous. Referring to last week's drive, we shall consider three approaches to the **CRAB-GRASS** problem:—

1. Killing the plants... We believe the best method is to spray the plants with a **POTASSIUM CYANATE**. Our choice is Bonide's **CRAB-NOT**.
2. Killing the seed as they germinate... This can be accomplished by distributing **CHLORDANE** or **CRAG HERBICIDE** on the surface of the ground about **MAY 15th**. (**CRAG HERBICIDE** should not be used unless your lawn re-seeding was done at least 7 weeks earlier.)

DETAILS AT THE SHOP

3. Production of thick turf... In general the home owner over-seeds and under-fertilizes. Lawn grasses prefer to be dormant in July and August while crab and quack grass and weeds love the broiling sun. Watering may turn the grass green but it does not make it grow unless there is nourishment in the soil. It merely promotes the growth of the other things.—

Therefore, we recommend the application of 1 pound of 10-6-1 (**WOODRUFF'S GRO-SOL**, **STADLER'S XXX** or **AGRICO'S TURF & HORT.**) per 100 sq. ft. on June 1st, July 1st and Aug. 1st.

Water it once a week and soak it to a depth of 5 to 6 inches. (If your lawn was fertilized after April 15th you may vary the above date to July 1st and August 1st.)

DON'T WATER WITHOUT FERTILIZING

Of course we sell fertilizer, but we are sincerely interested in seeing that the work and money you spend on your lawn are not wasted—and our recommendations are based on serious and wide study of one of Einstein's formulae.

With regard to garden weeds... The use of **CRAG HERBICIDE** after the plants are up 4-inches will kill most of the weed seeds as they germinate. The beds must be weeded and cultivated before the **CRAG HERBICIDE** can be applied.
