The decorations for the affair were spring flowers, with a table centerpiece of daffodils.

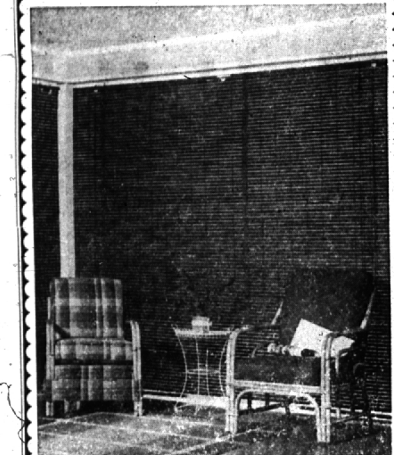
