Hunting Isn't The Same Today, Local Man Finds

Hunting, according to Dean H. Robinson, 3340 Highmeadow, Birmingham, isn't what it used to be.

Robinson, associated with the Model Home Planning company, Royal Oak, has just returned from a visit to his uncle in Omaha, and

brought with him a photostat of the "Annual Supper of the Plattsmouth Sportsmen's Club." Wildfowl included are geese, brant, mallards, green winged teal, blue winged teal, prairie chickens, quail, snipe and plover. Squirrel and rabbit also were included.

In addition to the plentiful supply of wild dishes, the menu included a wide assortment of vegetables, 10 desserts and several wines.

"THE INTERESTING thing is the lack of pheasants on the menu," Robinson commented.

"I asked about that and my uncle said there were no pheasants in America then. Today South Dakota and western Nebraska have millions and millions of the birds."

The old gentleman said that 200 men sat down to this Oct. 30, 1873 dinner, consuming more than a thousand birds. He had contributed 111 prairie chickens.

When asked who had prepared all those birds and other game, he snorted, (to quote Robinson) "The winnig, naturally!"

"I CAN IMAGINE what would happen to me if I trooped in the kitchen and tossed down that many prairie chickens on the table and said, 'Gee, sen, woman!' Robinson said. "The thought makes me shudder."

"We would hardly call this kind of 'slaughter' sportsmanlike today," he continued, "but these must have been a whale of a lot more game in those days than there is now."

"My uncle admits the hunting was easy—it was getting there that took time and was hard work."

"It took the hunters almost a day to get where the game was, traveling by wagon, for two hours of shooting. Then, almost another day to get home with the catch."

"I'll take my two ducks and my warm, fast start," Robinson concluded.

Cranbrook Film Explores Secrets Of Undersea Life

CRANBROOK — Dimitri Reibok's color film, "Exploring the Secrets of the Underwater World," is to be shown Nov. 10 at 8:15 p. m. by Cranbrook Institute of Science in the auditorium of Cranbrook School.

In the ocean depths the camera discovers wreck-hunters, marine flora and fauna, as well as sponge divers of Djerdah, filmed in the Mediterranean by a self-propelled torpedo camera. Paul Cherney, associate of Reibok, is commentator.

Admission is by member-ticket only, but Institute members may obtain guest tickets at the Institute lobby desk Nov. 10.

"Plants, Man and Culture," a scientist's report by Dr. Jonathan D. Sauer, will unfold the story of a group of cultivated plants and explain how study of them helped unravel the mysteries of curiously widespread and ancient human cultural traits. This report to be given Nov. 16 in the science auditorium is open to the public, but is not adapted to small children.
