Show, Talk, Trip In Mrs. DeSalle's Week

Busy with traveling, arranging a new show and planning a talk is Mrs. Peggy DeSalle of the Little Gallery.

"Modern Art", a group which dwells on modern art development with 25 people, is meeting at her gallery tomorrow night, and she will speak to the gallery for new show, opening next week, is an exhibition of African primitive sculpture, with authentic originals from the New York Carlabach galleries.




