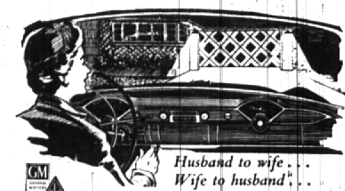

For good taste the arrangements and accessories should not cover more than one third the length of the table. Accessories, meaning small ornamental objects which enhance the central arrangement, are not placed with the flowers.

As a guide she keeps in mind three factors—color, texture and character.

COLORS of flowers should be related to the color of the room they are used in. The designer's eye is apt to determine the current choice. Rhythmic drift of one color within the arrangement are fun.

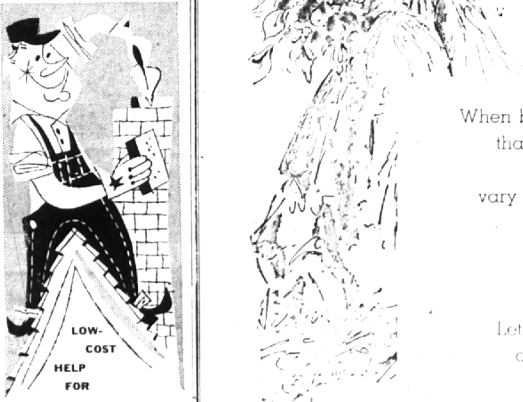
CHARACTER can be achieved by giving your table arrangement a style in good taste which is always present when the designer gives the task timely consideration.
