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35,000 Foreign Students In U.S., Says AAUW Speaker

Thirty-five thousand foreign students studying in American colleges are the "official ambassadors" who will take home with them ideas which will later influence their own government in its dealing with this country, said Dr. Herick B. Young, president of Western College for Women, in his speech before the November meeting of Birmingham branch, American Association of University Women.

"Public opinion is swayed by these unofficial ambassadors," said Dr. Young, "and public opinion dictates national policy." He explained that only about six thousand students come to our country on scholarships.

THE OTHERS come at their own expense. They want to study American methods and ways of life as first hand. Nearly all of these students return to occupy positions which permit them to influence many of their countrymen.

"Americans are now found in every city of the world. The rest of the world is trying to find out how to get along with us. Sociological rather than technological reasons bring them here," said Dr. Young.

The speaker wished especially to stress the importance of giving these students opportunities to learn how America lives at home, as well as giving them adequate facilities for learning. Over 1200 foreign students are now on the campus at Ann Arbor, with more than four thousand in New York and vicinity.

THERE is presently a widespread movement to scatter some of this concentration to smaller schools all over the country, so the students may take back a more comprehensive view of life here.

Dr. Young's wide experience abroad, as a teacher and representative of the Presbyterian foreign missions, has enabled him to see at first hand the results in foreign countries of student training here.

Society deadline is 3 p.m. each Tuesday.

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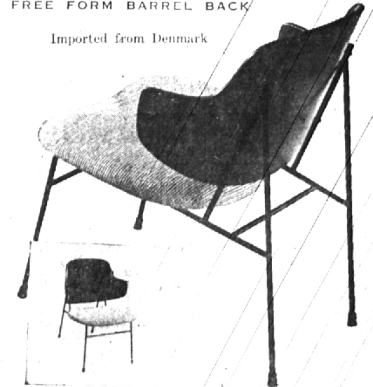
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
