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Opening Services Sunday In New \$700,000 Building

A two-fold purpose will be celebrated Sunday, Nov. 20, when Masses are held in the new Holy Name church which has been under construction for the past year and a half.

An all-parish reception is scheduled for the same afternoon from 2 to 5 p.m. in the school auditorium for Father Eugene Paddock, pastor, commemorating his 25th ordination year.

The old church, which stood for approximately 20 years, was torn down when it became over-crowded and provided a site for the present building.

The new \$700,000 construction of stone is located at the corner of Harmon and Woodland.

An addition to the new building is St. Agnes' hall, where parish functions, guild meetings and small gatherings will be held. Although it has been in use for the past week it is not completed. Finishing touches to be added are stained glass windows, mosaic and a side altar dedicated to the blessed mother.

A new schedule has been set up and will become effective on opening Sunday with Masses at 6:30, 7:45, 9, 10:15, 11:30 a.m. and 12:45 p.m.
