(Continued from Page 1, Sec. 5) should be clarified and term of office outlined specifically.

4. SINCE the present zoning ordinance was adopted by referendum, if the major amendment completely replaces the present zoning ordinance, the referendum vote on the charter, their vote could also be misconstrued as a referendum vote on the zoning ordinance.

5. Major amendment does not mean that the people who may have objections of zoning and/or township boards, thus leaving away from a procedure familiar to a democracy.

6. Major amendment does not provide for adequately notifying residents of changes in zoning in and around their area.

7. SECTION on penalties has not been reworded as to imply or be misconstrued to imply a \$100 maximum penalty for zoning violations rather than the previous \$100 per day for each offense.

8. Section on penalties does not clearly state whose responsibility it shall be to institute the section 9 procedure against violators of provisions of the zoning ordinance.

9. Section on public utilities should be specifically clarified, especially in respect to the issuing of water and/or depleting the water supply from existing homes in order to supply others in adjacent contemplated subdivisions.

10. IT APPEARS that the section regarding control of nuisance noise as previously set forth at the board hearing has now been omitted.

11. Term of office of the zoning board members should be limited and specified.

12. Swm discounted Molnar's claim that eight per cent of residents voting in a presidential election can sign a petition this forcing one before township trustees back to the zoning board. "It says they (trustees) shall vote to declare intentions, but it does not say how they will vote," Swm said.

MOLNAR claimed that zoning was the cause of the unsuccessful attempt in recent years to break from the township. "The people don't want to be harassed," Molnar said. "In fact, that (zoning) is why the township is trying to incorporate right now."

Anthony P. Walsh, Jr., 23704 Lee Haker, asked area representatives one before township trustees with Molnar. I don't think it would be fair if every area weren't represented.

WALCH also asked for more restrictive laws governing trailer parks claiming that township zoning should outline areas for parks and thereby contain them. New parks would be stopped unless one could expand without interference, said Walsh.

Ernie Lockwood, builder and resident, told those present that the amendment had overstepped its limits by for the state. "There are parts of the ordinance that can be broken. I don't think that the township board should be the one to flout the law," Lockwood said.

Irving H. Yackness, attorney for a Detroit builders' association, made a plea for change of the ordinance to state minimum requirements for lot sizes (50-foot frontage) as against the township's present 7,500 square foot requirement.

IN ANSWER to Yackness' claim that his group were willing to cooperate with the township for better building, Trustee Luther Wagner said, "We have been burdened with these model homes sponsored by your association, who broke restrictions in building those homes, and left one with a split-owner ship."

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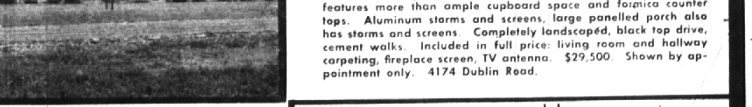
