

Board Studies Swimming Pool Ordinances

At a meeting last week the Birmingham Building Code Authority recommended adoption of a swimming pool ordinance to regulate all public and private pools.

Paul Harter, local chairman, introduced a Detroit ordinance for study and recommendations from the Birmingham group.

Under the Detroit system, all public and private swimming pools are regulated by the city's health department, which also handles enforcement.

The board plans to make a complete recommendation to the city commission.
