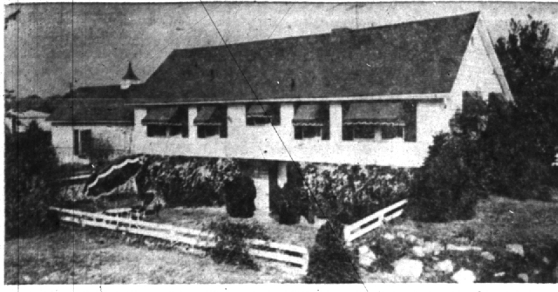

Franklin Home Built on Stone Foundation of Pioneer's Barn

Once an old barn on the property of Mr. and Mrs. J. Jennings Morse, Franklin road, a transformation has taken place and it now is the interesting and charming residence of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Layman, South Greenbrier.

The barn first built about 1840 was blown down in 1942; rebuilt and used for stock. Five years later Morse finished it as a residence, using the original stone foundation and changing windows in the

box stall to doors. Morse had been reluctant to sell the place which had belonged to his family for so long a time, and only recently has possession of the unusual house come to the Laymans.

The ground floor is used for heating and laundry equipment and living quarters on the second floor contain a large living room with dining, "L", three bedrooms, two baths and a kitchen.

Interior decorations are in keeping with the age and spirit of the place and Mrs. Layman has tastefully used many traditional pieces

for furnishings. Although the Laymans have been living at the South Greenbrier address only since June, they are not newcomers to Franklin, having lived for five years on Komany way.

Mrs. Layman is an attorney by profession, receiving her law degree from the University of Detroit. She is active in the League of Women Voters and American Association of University Women, serving last year as program chairman and at present, legislative chairman. Mr. Layman is vice president of Turner Brothers, Inc.
