A former township boy suffocated Sunday night in a cave in at a quarry site in Orlando, Fla., where he and other companions were in a tunnel.

The victim, Timothy Decker, age 12, moved to Florida recently with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ward M. Decker, formerly of 1491 Bamnor.

Boysfriends said Timothy was found on his back in the tunnel and passing out dirt to them when it caved in. He died before he could be freed.
