

Special Fire Marshall Aid Prevention Week

Parents be careful during Fire Prevention Week because your child may be one of the 3,000 Junior Fire Marshals the city "dupertized" this week.

Guided by Birmingham Fire Marshal George Smith, Dalton H. Lamb, 2229 Norchester, and Albert Bates, 922 McKeegan, have distributed nearly 3,000 forms through the schools to carry the thought of fire prevention to the homes.

THE FORMS were given to children through the sixth grade. They will designate their own fire Marshall and check off all electrical devices and possible fire hazards in the home which are listed on the forms.

As a reward for their efforts and cooperation during the week, children will receive a Junior Marshall card, badge and helmet when forms are returned.

"The kids learn a great deal in fire prevention this way," said Scott.

IN CONJUNCTION with fire prevention week, Chief Park Smith calls on all residents to adhere to the "do's and don'ts" in preventing and extinguishing fires.

Nearly 12,000 Americans die yearly and twice this number are burned and disfigured in fires, he warned.

"Biggest cause," said Chief Smith, "is carelessness."

Daily there are 1,150 home fires, 15 store fires, 101 factory fires, 82 barn fires, 12 school fires and 4 hospital fires in the United States, he added.

- PREVENTIVE** measures such as these need be taken, he said:
1. Have your entire heating unit checked, including furnace pipes, ducts and chimneys.
 2. Remove temptation by keeping matches and lighters away from children.
 3. Smoke your last cigarette **BEFORE** getting into bed.
 4. Replace frayed and defective cords and electrical equipment.
 5. Fuses should not exceed 15 Amps on the average home lighting circuit.
 6. **BE SURE** you have good spark screen on top of chimney if you have coal furnace, fireplace or interior incinerator.
 7. Keep rubbish, oily rags and discarded furniture out of the home.
 8. Dry cleaning at home with flammable solvents is invitation for fire.
 9. Call MI 4-1616 in Birmingham at the sign of the slightest fire. Have the phone number of your fire department really available.

CARL E. PAULSEN, 67, 65 Colonial George Birmingham, died in his sleep from a heart attack while visiting his daughter, Christine, a student at Oberlin college, Ohio, on Oct. 24.

Born in Copenhagen, Denmark, Paulsen had been a Detroit area resident since 1924. He was one of the original organizers of Detroit Branch C, in 1914, and served the company as plant superintendent and vice president for many years, more recently being on a consulting basis with the company.

A member of Palestine lodge, Mr. Paulsen is survived by his wife, Netta at their home, along with his daughter.

Funeral services will be held at the James A. Lamb funeral home, Pittsburgh, Pa. on Thursday, with burial in Jefferson Memorial park in the same city.

HANS G. KNOLL, II, president of Knoll Associates, Inc., leading manufacturers of contemporary furniture and textiles, died Oct. 2 in an auto accident. He was in Tulsa on business.

Mr. Knoll pioneered the United States in the advancement of modern furniture and textiles. He conceived the idea of collaborating with designers, encouraging their special talents and to accomplish this he worked with many well known international artists and designers.

He was responsible for the introduction of the modern plastic shell chair designed by Eero Saarinen, Bloomfield Hills architect.

Knoll Associates and its affiliated enterprises will continue under the management of Mrs. Florence S. Knoll, his wife, and other family members. Mrs. Knoll was at the Cranbrook Academy of Art, 20 years ago with the late Elie Saatchi.

A memorial service was conducted Wednesday in New York.

FRANK GIBNER, 50, of 1010 Birmingham, died Wednesday morning at Bloomfield hospital after an illness of three months.

Born Feb. 2, 1875, in Hungary, he came to Birmingham in 1922 from Springfield, Pa. He was a member of the Senior Citizens group at the Community House.

Survivors include his son, Frank A., with whom he made his home; a daughter, Mrs. Carl E. Nelson of Irvington, N. J.; a son and two daughters, Mrs. John Feinberg, Joseph and Carl Gibner, all of Pennsylvania.
