Casual cookery is what Girl Scouts love, and there's nothing as tasty as bacon and eggs cooked on a liddly burner.

What's that? The seventh grade girls who belong to Beverly Hills' Girl Scout troop No. 411 know from experience what they are, how to make them, and recently had a chance to cook in semi-primitive camp life on liddly burners.
